ABOUT THE PROGRAM

The Educational Service Center of Central Ohio's Hearing Impaired Program has provided comprehensive services for more than 20 years. Our purpose is to meet the learning needs of students across the full continuum of hearing loss – from moderate to profound.

Parents are key members of the team in developing individualized services for their child. Their involvement has been a cornerstone since the programs' inception.

Expertise by specially trained and licensed professionals in hearing impairment is coupled with the content specialization of regular education professionals to provide a rich model for inclusive education.

The unique learning styles of students with hearing loss are addressed in a regular education environment. While the regular classroom is the primary learning site, direct instruction and pre-reading/pre-writing supports are also utilized in a resource room as needed.

PROGRAM COMPONENTS

- Comprehensive services for students with a hearing loss from preschool through grade 12
- Individualized audiological technology for students with identified hearing loss—from moderate to profound
- Communication modalities cover the continuum of options and include: aural/oral, Signed English, Pidgin Signed English, and American Sign Language (ASL)
- Direct instruction by specialists in hearing impairment along with inclusion in regular education classes for content specialists instruction
- Goals and objectives follow state content standards
- Curricular modifications and accommodations based on individual student needs with on-going collaboration
- Specialized and licensed staff able to serve the broad range of needs in this population
- Opportunities for deaf culture growth and knowledge through community involvement
- Parent contact, feedback and programming involvement
- Building-level sign language classes offered to students and staff.
